31 December 2019

- A pneumonia of unknown cause detected in Wuhan, China was first reported to the WHO Country Office in China.

14-16 January 2020

- **Dr Burgis spent about 40 hours in Wuhan, arriving at 7.40 pm on 14 January and departing at 11.30 am on 16 January**
- **“During the holidays I spent a day in China. Susan and I travelled to Vietnam to see our daughter, Tiffany, and her family. They live in Hanoi. We spent a few weeks with them. One of my goals for 2020 is to establish a means by which we can serve the global educational community, earn an extra income for the College, and limit school fee rises. I went to China to meet a family that has established a school. They are looking for assistance with teacher development. I flew in from Hanoi. I was met at the airport in a private car, and taken to a hotel. The next day I visited their school and was engaged in talks. Then back to the hotel to sleep, and by private car to the airport. I came back to Australia promptly. Very little contact with anyone! I received medical clearance from the doctor. At that stage, there was no word that the Coronavirus had an asymptomatic effect on affected persons. Thus, I was at work last week. Once we decided to make the rule regarding those who had been to China, I imposed it on myself as well, even though I am perfectly well. I returned to work on Friday 31 January.” Mrs Leah Russell, Chairwoman of College Council and Mrs Nicola Taylor, Principal of PLCA also accompanied him on the trip.**

- Government introduces a ban on indoor gatherings of more than 100 people. Schools, universities, airports, public transport and other essential services are exempt.
- \$715 million worth of support for airlines announced.
- New restrictions on aged-care facilities, barring visitors who have recently been overseas, in contact with a confirmed coronavirus case or showing potential symptoms.
- Morrison intervenes on the issue of panic-buying, declaring: "Stop hoarding. I can't be more blunt about it. Stop it."

- **“The pool and gymnasium closed today, in line with government regulations.”**
- **“I will also be announcing a new prize at Speech Day connected to a new initiative next week to help us see how significant and positive these days could be for our future.”**

23 March 2020

- Under “stage one” of the national cabinet’s response, pubs, clubs, gyms, cinemas, casinos and religious gatherings shut down nationwide from midday. Restaurants and cafes restricted to takeaway and delivery.
- Confusion reigns over the status of schools, with the federal government declaring schools should remain open while Victoria brings forward schools holidays and NSW and the ACT put in place partial closures and distance learning.
- Health Minister Greg Hunt says 1.5 million further test kits have been ordered.

- Temporary suspension of all non-urgent elective procedures in both the public and private sector; progressive scale up of social distancing measures with stronger measures in relation to non-essential gatherings, and considerations of further more intense options; and aged care providers limit visits to a maximum of two visitors at one time per day.

- PM urges people to stay home and only leave for essential work and important tasks.
- The number of confirmed cases from the Ruby Princess rises to 133, with a woman in her 70s who was on the ship dies in Sydney.

25 March 2020

- Government begins sending out millions of official text messages, advising people: “To stop the spread stay 1.5 metres from others, follow rules on social gatherings, wash hands, stay home if sick.”
- With NSW and Victoria agitating for “stage three”, national Deputy Chief Medical Officer Paul Kelly says all officials agree on the measures that should be adopted but the dispute is about “two schools of thoughts”, one for hard and fast and the other for a scalable, proportional strategy.
- Federal Labor begins to question the government’s strategy, calling for a stricter shutdown and expanded economic and social measures.
- With more test kits becoming available, the government broadens the strict testing criteria to include more people.
- All non-urgent elective surgeries are suspended.
- Government establishes a COVID-19 co-ordination commission to tackle the economic and social impact of the pandemic.

We will make the top level of Macindoe a quarantine area for Year 12 only (NO STAFF OR STUDENTS) from the start of term 4. Wind instruments (flute, clarinet, recorder) at 3 metres. I note here that PLC Sydney is branching out into ukuleles now in order to create something positive out of a tricky situation.

-No camps can go ahead.

-Therapists and peripatetic staff can continue their work on campus.

Students playing non-reeded woodwind instruments such as flutes and recorders should be positioned so that they can maintain a physical distance of 1.5 metres from all persons (including other members of the musical group). They must also maintain a minimum 3 metres space between the direction of airflow from their instruments and other performers,
 - *There are no recommended limits on singing groups in schools, including for in-class educational activities including repetition, chanting, recitation, or singing activities. Five metres is recommended between a group of performing singers and other people, including the audience and conductor, where practicable,
 - *Dancing activities, including dance classes, formals and social events, can proceed, with organisers complying with any venue restrictions,
 - *Boarding schools have had restrictions lifted on separating cohorts of students to assist in their rooming arrangements and general organisation. Ms Turner will communicate further with boarding families when she returns from leave this week. (I thank Mrs Harding and Ms Hayek for stepping in on her behalf at short notice recently. Ms Hayek returns to her duties with the Transition class this week).
